AMH 4316: THE HISTORY OF VIOLENCE IN AMERICA

Course Requirements:

AMH 4316 will explore the history of violent behavior, particularly violent crime, in America. A midterm examination, a short research paper, and an end-of-semester examination will be required. The midterm examination, which will be given on October 7, will be worth 25 percent of your grade, and the research paper, which will be due on November 18 (at the beginning of class and in hard copy), will be four pages in length and will be worth 25 percent of the course grade. An additional 25 percent of your grade will be based on attendance, which is mandatory, and class participation. The end-of-semester examination will be given on December 7 (at 8:30 a.m.) and will be worth 25 percent of your grade. Students cannot pass this course unless they complete both examinations and submit the required paper, and there will be no make-up examinations, except in cases of medical emergencies. This course will employ UF's grading scale (A=4.0; A=3.67; B=3.0; B=3.0; B=2.67; C=2.0; C=1.67; D=1.33; D=1.0; D=0.67; E=0.0). Cell phones should not be used during class, and laptop computers should be used only for note taking.
