
HISTORY HONORS PROGRAM



Participants in the program:

- » are outstanding students from History as well as other departments, interested in taking their studies to the next level.
- » complete a senior thesis, a 40-50-page project of original research
- » graduate with High or Highest Honors (assuming 3.5 upper division GPA).
- » have gone on to law, professional, and graduate school at topranked universities across the country.

SCHEDULE

-	Years 2-3	get to know potential advisors and develop potential topics; take History Research Seminar (4930); participate in a study abroad program; work on language training
	Year 3 (SPRING)	apply to the Honors Program; apply to the University Scholars Program and for History Department travel fellowships; if possible, begin research over the summer
	Year 4 (FALL)	enroll in Thesis Workshop (HIS 4971); refine topic, conduct bulk of research, and begin writing
	Year 4 (SPRING)	enroll in Senior Thesis Research (HIS 4970); complete research and writing of thesis; participate in Honors Conference at Library East (one Saturday in April)
